What is an interdisciplinary book project?

IDL Book Projects...

... use books and reading materials to enrich topics

... create cross curricular connections and collaborations

... show the wider importance of reading

... are fun, engaging and inclusive



Reading Schools Framework

Key area 2.2.2: Interdisciplinary Book Projects

Ensuring that readers **are able to respond to books in creative and crosscurricular ways**, and demonstrating to learners that reading for pleasure **is relevant and useful outside of literacy / English**.

Schools should use book projects to **inspire classes to read** by completing the below mandatory action:

Primary – ensuring every learner does one interdisciplinary project per year

Secondary – ensuring every learner in **S1–3** does one project per year (this can be in English lessons)

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Great practice - Books

The High School Dundee's Art department, in partnership with the English department ran a 'create your own book cover' challenge for all S1s.

Rosewell Primary School used The Last Bear across their classes to explore maps and climate change, conduct litter picks, research nutrition and survival and run mini-raft experiments.

St David's Primary School used The BFG to make their own juice, design protype forks, measure their footprints to compare and created their own dream jars.







Great practice - Topics

Prestwick Academy created a social subjects reading challenge tying in with a focus on war and conflict, involving RME, Geography, History, Modern Studies and English.

St John's RC High School's library and Home-Ec department ran a Family Food Club, where learners researched recipes and then cooked meals with their families in school.

Kirkhill Primary School explored the Victorian era, using non-fiction and stories. They also ran an ancient Egypt project, using Flat Stanley to make the complex learning more accessible and relate
