Reading Schools journey

- 2017: First Minister's Reading Challenge launches
- 2019: Phase 1 pilot in Forth Valley, West Lothian
- 2020: Phase 2 pilot in Stirling, Dundee, Perth + Kinross, Angus
- 2021: www.readingschools.scot launches, pilot extended to West Partnership local authorities
- 2022: Reading School opens to every school in Scotland
- 2023: Reading Schools Early Years piloted in Angus
- 2025: Here you all are!

- A coherent structure for all your reading and literacy initiatives, through a framework mapped to the Quality Improvement Framework for the Early Learning and Childcare sectors
